Amelia Earhart is famous for breaking barriers as the first woman to fly across the Atlantic solo and for disappearing over the Pacific Ocean on a voyage in 1937. But where did the adventurer grow up? Amelia Earhart was born in Atchison, Kansas and grew up in the city until 1909, when she moved to Des Moines, Iowa.

On June 17 1928, Amelia arrived at Bury Point , Wales and 21 hours later, the flight made headlines. In 1931 Amelia married George Putnam, they met when he published one of her books 20 hours-40 minutes. In June 1937, she attempted to be the first woman to fly around the world but she never made it, Amelia Earhart vanished on July 2, 1937.

Amelia had seen a plane for the first time at the age of 10 and was not impressed by what she saw. However, December 28, 1920 was one of the most exciting days and turning points in Amelia’s life. Earhart’s interest in flying began on December 28, 1920, when she and her father were visiting an air show in Long Beach, California.

On 5 January 1939, Amelia Earhart was declared legally dead in a court in Los Angeles. To this day, the circumstances of her disappearance and the location of her remains is a mystery. Being the first female to fly solo, non-stop across the Atlantic Ocean was worth more to Amelia than her own life.

### Amelia Earhart: missing in action

Earhart took her first flying lesson on January 3, 1921 and, in six months, managed to save enough money to buy her first plane. The second-hand Kinner Airster was a two-seater biplane painted bright yellow—Earhart named her newest obsession, “The Canary,” and used it to set her first women’s record by rising to an altitude of 14,000 feet.
