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Chinese Public Attitudes Toward Epilepsy

PURPOSE: Epilepsy is a significant yet seriously underappreciated public health issue in Mainland China. The stigma and discrimination toward people with epilepsy (PWE) and their families are especially severe in China based on cultural misconceptions which cause tremendous psychological, economic and social burdens. It is imperative to formulate a targeted public intervention to eliminate knowledge gaps and correct these misconceptions of epilepsy.

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METHOD: The Chinese Public Attitudes Toward Epilepsy (CPATE) scale was administered to 184 neurological and 264 non-neurological medical staff members from basic-level hospitals in southern China. Positively stated items in the PATE scale were reversely scored; in this case, a higher score would indicate a more negative attitude.

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Validation of the Chinese version of public attitudes ...

The mean score from general knowledge about epilepsy was higher among medical staff in tertiary hospitals than in basic-level hospitals. The mean scores in the general and personal domain of the Chinese Public Attitudes Toward Epilepsy (CPATE) scale were both significantly lower among medical staff in tertiary hospitals, when compared to those of basic-level hospitals.

The purpose of the Knowledge, Attitudes, and Practice toward Epilepsy (KAPE) Project was to conduct a national cross-sectional survey to assess knowledge of and attitudes and practice toward epilepsy in a multistate study of Chinese and Vietnamese adults living in the United States.

Attitudes and beliefs about epilepsy in people with epilepsy and their family members in urban and rural China have been reported previously . In this study, we sought to explore the attitudes and beliefs of non-family 'others' who, by virtue of operating in public position and the institutional sphere, represent potentially key perpetrator groups.

Stigma of People with Epilepsy in China: Views of health ...

As suggested, the attitudes toward epilepsy in China were far more negative than those in other countries 4, 7. Our study showed that the attitudes of local Hong Kong Chinese are much less negative compared with those of the Chinese in Mainland China and Taiwan . We believe that the influx of western culture, improved general education standard, legislation against discrimination against the disabled, and efforts of social organizations are responsible for the difference.

Public Awareness, Attitude, and Understanding of Epilepsy ...

Surveys conducted among Chinese in China (1), Taiwan (2), Malaysia (3, 4), Singapore (5), and Hong Kong (6) with a standard protocol demonstrated the existence of bias and discrimination against people with epilepsy. Although similarities existed in certain aspects of KAPE, regional differences were found even among Chinese.

Survey of Public Awareness, Understanding, and Attitudes ...

The stigma toward epilepsy is especially severe in China due to traditional and superstitious views. The overall KAP was better in tertiary hospitals than basic-level hospitals. Interventions aiming at reducing discrimination against epilepsy among medical workers are needed.

Epilepsy, a complex spectrum of disorders, merits enhanced public health action. In 2012, the Institute of Medicine (IOM) released a seminal report on the public health dimensions of the epilepsies, recommending actions in 7 domains. The report urged a more integrated and coordinated national approach for care centering on the whole patient, including heightened attention to comorbidities and ...

Toward an Integrated Public Health Approach for Epilepsy ...

Education reduced the respondent's prejudice against play and employment, but did not change their objection to marriage and appeared to have reinforced their linking epilepsy with insanity. As compared with the surveys conducted in Western countries, our survey showed that awareness of epilepsy in China was greater, if not the same, but the attitudes toward epilepsy were much more negative.

The PASG members were authorized the use of the original Chinese version of the "Public Awareness, Attitude and Understanding of Epilepsy" questionnaire as a comparison of four Asian countries (China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore and Malaysia) in 1998-1999. The Singaporeans 4 and Malaysians 5 had published their pilot data.

Attitudes. Epilepsy-related attitudes regarding children's association and marriage with an epileptic person were somewhat more positive than results for Chinese and Taiwanese respondents and subjects from Tanzania. Compared with the West German sample, our subjects rejected less the possibility of children's association.

Understanding and attitudes towards epilepsy among the general public plays a major role in determining the extent to which people with epilepsy could be integrated into their societies [10]. Gauging the knowledge, attitude and understanding of epilepsy is the first step towards alleviating discrimination.
